ORDER

On February 6, 2020, the Commission issued an order approving a settlement agreement in Case No. U-20599 (February 6 order), which, among other things, approved Northern States Power Company – Wisconsin’s (NSP-W’s) multistate integrated resource plan (IRP) pursuant to MCL 460.6t. February 6 order, p. 3. The February 6 order also directed NSP-W to “file its next [IRP] within five years from the date of this order, consistent with the terms of the settlement agreement.” *Id.*

On October 24, 2024, NSP-W filed a motion in the instant case to extend the time for filing its next IRP (motion). NSP-W represents that “[i]n NSP-W’s last IRP case before the Commission,

pursuant to MCL 460.6t(4),^[1] the Company secured extensions for filing the IRP based on when [its sister company, Northern States Power Company – Minnesota (NSP-M)^{2]} would make its IRP filing with the Minnesota Public Utility Commission (MPUC).” Motion, p. 2. NSP-M filed its IRP with the MPUC on February 1, 2024, and a settlement was reached. *Id.*, p. 3. However, “a final MPUC order regarding NSP-M’s IRP settlement is not expected prior to the 5 year filing deadline established in [the February 6 order.]” *Id.* As a result, “NSP-W seeks to extend the filing deadline ordered in [the February 6 order], and requests [an] extension to file its IRP to within 60 days following the MPUC’s final order in NSP-M’s IRP case.” Motion, p. 3. NSP-W states that “this request is consistent with MCL 460.6t(4) and the intent of the [February 6 order] and is in the public interest, as delaying the timing for filing the Michigan IRP will save on Company and administrative resources.” *Id.* No party filed a response to the motion.

Considering the representations made by NSP-W in its motion and the authority provided in MCL 460.6t(4), the Commission finds that NSP-W’s request to extend the filing date for its next IRP is reasonable and should be granted.

¹ MCL 460.6t(4) provides, in relevant part, that “[u]pon request of an electric utility, the commission may adjust the filing dates for a multistate integrated resource plan filing in this state to place its review on the same timeline as other relevant state reviews.”

² NSP-W explains that “NSP-W and its sister company, Northern States Powers Company – Minnesota (NSP-M) plan, build, and operate a single integrated electric transmission and production system, which is known as the NSP System. NSP-W and NSP-M jointly conduct resource planning for the five-state Upper Midwest system served by the two companies, which includes service territory in Minnesota, North Dakota, South Dakota, Wisconsin, and Michigan—a/k/a the NSP System.” Motion, p. 2. “NSP-M is subject to an IRP filing requirement in Minnesota.” *Id.*

THEREFORE, IT IS ORDERED that:

A. Northern States Power Company – Wisconsin’s motion for extension of time to file its multistate integrated resource plan is granted.

B. Northern States Power Company – Wisconsin shall provide the Commission with prompt notice of issuance of the Minnesota Public Utility Commission’s final order in the Northern States Power Company – Minnesota integrated resource plan that was filed with the Minnesota Public Utility Commission on February 1, 2024.

C. Northern States Power Company – Wisconsin shall file its multistate integrated resource plan with the Commission within 60 days following the issuance of the Minnesota Public Utility Commission’s final order in the Northern States Power Company – Minnesota’s integrated resource plan that was filed with the Minnesota Public Utility Commission on February 1, 2024.

The Commission reserves jurisdiction and may issue further orders as necessary.

Any party desiring to appeal this order must do so in the appropriate court within 30 days after issuance and notice of this order, pursuant to MCL 462.26. To comply with the Michigan Rules of Court's requirement to notify the Commission of an appeal, appellants shall send required notices to both the Commission's Executive Secretary and to the Commission's Legal Counsel.


