IV. OTHER ORDERS

A. ELECTRIC

1. U-17377 IN THE MATTER, ON THE COMMISSION'S OWN MOTION, TO IMPLEMENT THE PROVISIONS OF 2013 PA 95, AS AMENDED (notice regarding low-income energy assistance fund/proposed funding factor/opportunity to comment)

Commission Staff Reka Holley-Voelker, Strategic Operations Division, presented a brief synopsis of the case listed above. Commissioner Peretick moved that the Commission approve the order at its February 11, 2025 meeting. Commissioner Carreon seconded that motion.

Chair Scripps commented:

"I just want to highlight a couple of key elements in Public Acts 168, 169, 170, and 198 of 2024 as described by Ms. Holley-Voelker and how the order in front of us today takes action on these changes. Among the other elements covered in Ms. Holley-Voelker's presentation, the order in front of us today takes the first step in increasing the funding for MEAP. Again, proposing to set the funding factor of 2025 at \$1.25 per meter per month. This, when combined with the elimination of the total cap, is expected to result in approximately \$71 million for MEAP assistance in fiscal year 2025-2026. This is an increase of more than 40% from the \$50 million collected in previous years. In addition, I also note that Governor Whitmer's executive budget recommendation included an additional \$25 million for MEAP. Which, if enacted by the Legislature, it would essentially get us to year two. A year earlier than otherwise.

In addition to increasing the funds available, as noted by Ms. Holley-Voelker, last year's amendments also expanded the number of Michiganders who are eligible for assistance under MEAP. Previously, a family of four was eligible if it made up to 150% of the federal poverty guideline, which equated to \$46,800. Now that same family is eligible if it makes 60% of the

median state income or \$61,861 beginning October 1, 2025. That is an additional \$15,000 in income while still remaining eligible for this important assistance. With higher income eligibility, MEAP could provide energy assistance to as many as 335,000 Michigan households.

Last Thursday, Commissioner Carreon and I had the opportunity to participate in an event celebrating these important statutory reforms. We heard from Governor Whitmer, some of the key bill sponsors, and representatives of community-based organizations, MEAP grantees, utilities and faith leaders. What struck me most was how often the word dignity was used. This additional support, in the words of Dr. Darienne Hudson, CEO of the United Way for Southeastern Michigan, 'It was about much more than just being able to pay a bill.' Through the testimonials and speeches, I was reminded of the quote from the author W. Somerset Maugham, who describing the toll poverty can take, once wrote, 'They have never felt the iron of poverty in their flesh. They do not know how mean it makes you. It exposes you to endless humiliation. It cuts your wings. It eats into your soul like a cancer. It is not wealth one asks for, but just enough to preserve one's dignity, to work unhampered, to be generous, frank, and independent.' Reforms enacted by the Legislature and signed into law at the end of last year and the order before us today takes the first step in implementing them, provide just that additional measure of independence, that additional measure of dignity.

I appreciate the work of all involved in supporting both this additional funding and the important changes to the program that it will make it a little easier to navigate. Particularly, to you Ms. Holley-Voelker, as well as Anne Armstrong, and Mary Wilkens, from the Commission staff. I also want to thank those MEAP grantees who will work directly to get this additional assistance into the hands of those Michiganders who need it most. I am pleased to support this order."

V. PRESENTATION ON GEOGRAPHIC INFORMATION SYSTEM (GIS) MAPPING WEB PAGE

Brian Sheldon and Michele Powell, Energy Operations Division, provided a brief overview of the web page.

Commissioner Peretick commented:

"I would like to say thank you to Ms. Powell and Mr. Sheldon for their hard work on this mapping initiative. This was a request that I brought to Brian a long time ago, and he and his team ran with it and made the end result so much better than I expected. Transparency of our work and the energy system in Michigan is so important, and this is a really big step forward in improving that transparency and accessibility of our energy infrastructure information in our state. I highly recommend everyone go to our website and check out these maps for themselves as Ms. Powell described – I spent hours looking through them, and getting lost in the data. I expect many of you will find them just as valuable and interesting as I did. A big thank you to the team."

Chair Scripps commented:

"Our mission is to be a best-in-class Commission. That is something that is deeply embedded in the culture here at the Commission. It is examples like this and what we saw from Mr. Sheldon and Ms. Powell that, I think, represent that culture best. We have had maps for a number of years. They were in many cases outdated. Instead of just taking what we had and making a few tweaks and calling it good, they used it as an opportunity, driven with some encouragement from my colleagues, to go above and beyond as they so often do, and this is the result. I think this is among the best examples of utility data and GIS presentation in the country.

I really appreciate the work of the two of you and the many others who worked on this project. I will also note that when we published this and sent out a press release last week on it, I received a number of messages from energy wonks all across the state – literally from Southeast Michigan to the U.P., including former legislators, agency heads, and others who have spent hours (like Commissioner Peretick mentioned) getting into the data and sort of 'geeking out' a little bit. The ability to make that information available in a highly transparent and accessible way, I think speaks volumes to the way that we approach our work in general.

Again, I appreciate your work and that of the many others who are involved in this project."

VI. PUBLIC COMMENTS

Val Wohlscheid-Brennan provided comments and Exhibit VWB-1 (attached) regarding Case No. U-21471.

Heidi Brown addressed her concerns regarding Case No. U-21471.

Commissioner Peretick announced:

"I would like to thank the utility workers who prepared the system for the wind and ice storms that we have had in the first weeks of this year. While we have had some difficult windy and icy weather, we have had minimal electrical outages as a result of this preparation and focus on reliability improvement.

I'd like to note that there are a couple upcoming staff-led meetings that the public is encouraged to participate in:

- Immediately following this Commission Meeting, at 2:00 p.m. today, our staff is hosting a technical conference on the Michigan Potential Study on Energy Waste Reduction, demand response, and electrification. All are encouraged to attend virtually, and the link can be found on our website.
- The next Affordability, Alignment, and Assistance Subcommittee of the Energy Affordability and Accessibility Collaborative meeting is being held from 1:00-2:00 p.m. on March 4th. All interested parties are encouraged to attend, and you can sign up to receive meeting notices and participate in the meeting on the MPSC's website."

Chair Scripps announced:

"I would like to note that House Speaker, Matt Hall, recently announced committee leadership and membership for the 2025-2026 legislative session. I want to congratulate House members on their committee assignments, and particularly those serving on the House Energy Committee, including Chair Pauline Wendzel, Majority Vice Chair, Dave Prestin, and Minority Chair Joe Tate; the House Communications and Technology Committee, including Jaime Green, Majority Vice Chair Tom Kunse, and Minority Vice Chair Helena Scott; the House Appropriation Subcommittee for Licensing and Regulatory Affairs and Insurance and Financial Services (which controls our budget), including Chair Timothy Beson, Majority Vice Chair Donni Steele and Minority Vice Chair Donavan McKinney. We look forward to working with these Committee Chairs and Vice Chairs, as well as the individual members in the weeks and months ahead.

Second, as we do each February, the Commission is again this year celebrating Black History Month. It is an opportunity to note the many was that Black Americans have contributed to our state and country and to the Michigan Public Service Commission, in particular. As Governor Whitmer and Lieutenant Governor Gilchrist noted in proclaiming February as Black History Month in Michigan, during this month Michiganders are invited to honor the courage, achievements, and lasting contributions of B — lack Americans who have shaped our state and nation. Black History Month is also a time to reflect upon the continued commitment to equity, freedom, and progress as we continue to build a more inclusive future. Here at the Commission, we continue to carry this commitment into each facet of our work this month and every month, to our work around employee engagement and wellness, to build on the strengths of our diversity as an organization, to our work around outreach and relationship building in communities around the state, to our work on process improvements and efforts to expand public participation in our proceedings and other activities, and to our work as regulators overseeing the critical infrastructure on which we increasingly rely.

In her note to our staff this morning, celebrating Black History Month, Commissioner Carreon quoted the great Jackie Robinson, who was the first Black baseball player to play in the American

major leagues during the 20^{th} century, who once said 'Life is not important except in the impact that it has on other lives.' I can not think of a better metric. As Commissioner Carreon noted, our collective work impacts the lives of many Michiganders. I want to thank her in expressing our sincere appreciation to the Commission staff for their diligence.

Finally, though warmer weather still seems in many ways a ways off yet, there are definite signs of spring if you know where to look. Specifically, tomorrow is the first workout for pitchers and catchers. The Tigers kickoff spring training with their first game a week from Saturday. Opening day is just 59 days away. Go Tigers!"
